Some time ago I came across an article about forgiveness, written by a staff writer from the Mayo Clinic. As I read the article I was intrigued by the writer's concept of this topic which I would like to share with you:

"When someone you care about hurts you," she said, "you can hold on to anger, resentment, and thoughts of revenge — or embrace forgiveness and move forward."

This article lead me to the question "what is forgiveness?" What does forgiveness mean to us as professed Christians?

It is said that forgiveness means different things to different people "because it involves a decision to let go of resentment and thoughts of revenge." Forgiveness can be challenging, especially if the offender does not admit they're wrong. I am

sure that you and I have experienced being wronged by someone, whether by a friend or a family member or someone we trusted very much. When we hang on to negative feelings it can do great harm to our health.

Dr. Tyler VanderWeele, co-director of the Initiative on Health, Religion, and Spirituality of the Harvard School of Public Health stated "Scripture teaches us that 'forgiveness' is essential for us to enjoy a healthy relationship."

And, as François Varillon once said, "People cannot live together unless they forgive each other just for being who they are. We all need to forgive and be forgiven, over and over again, if our life together is to be life-giving, and if we are to be the agents of healing and reconciliation in the world that Christ calls us to be," -- we need to have that true spirit of forgiveness.

I don't know if you are struggling to forgive someone, or if you have to apologize—but I think that opening your heart and getting exposed to your wounds and mistakes is the key to forgiveness.

Let us keep in mind that God offers forgiveness to us when we sin against Him, and He expects us to show the same to our fellow men because forgiveness is rooted in a proper relationship with God.

Pay attention to this Biblical advice, "Then Peter came and said to Him,

'Lord if another member of the church sins against me, how often should I forgive? As many as seven times?' Jesus said to him, 'Not seven times, but, I tell you, seventy-seven times." Matthew 18:21-22 NRSV In Matthew 6:14-15, says the Lord, "For if you forgive others their trespasses, your heavenly Father will also forgive you; but if you do not forgive others, neither will your Father forgive your trespasses."

Let us practice the spirit of forgiveness in our daily lives.

"Forgiveness, in a psychological sense, is the intentional and voluntary process by which one who may initially feel victimized or wronged, goes through a change in feelings and attitude regarding a given offender, and overcomes the impact of the offense including negative emotions such as resentment and a desire for vengeance (however justified it might be)."

There it was. Staring up at me from the page of my anatomy and physiology workbook. "It" was the date that my final class assignment was due, and I was staring back at it, acknowledging that I had been procrastinating for three entire weeks before even starting on it. I had only twenty-four hours left before I needed to turn it in and my mind and stomach were churning. Where to begin... and how to even attempt to explain why it would not be

finished?

Then, just moments later, the college professor sent out a message that changed my whole outlook from one of failure to one of freedom. Every student in my class was being given an extra two weeks to complete the assignment. And my grateful heart rejoiced at the grace being offered. I did not earn it. I did not deserve it. But I received it. I was at peace.

Grace and peace. How interesting that the Bible writers, especially Paul, frequently used those two words, and in that order. As fiery Saul, he was given the gift of grace on the way to Damascus, when Jesus came to him and turned his hatred upside down. As passionate Paul, he was given the gift of peace to boldly preach the Gospel, focusing completely on Jesus' love.


At a recent Bible study of Plain Revelation, our group discussed Ranko Stefanovic's observation that GRACE (charis) is from a Greek greeting, meaning "I rejoice" or "I am glad." We can see the English words "charity" and "charitable" from that root word. PEACE (shalom) is a Hebrew greeting meaning harmony or absence of disturbance. Both Paul and John used this combination of greetings knowing that their letters would be heard by all those seeking the truth and grace that comes only from God. As Bruce M. Metzger pointed out, the order of the words "grace" and then "peace" is used because "grace is the divine favor bestowed upon human beings and peace is the state of spiritual wellbeing, which follows as the result."

David sang his songs of praise and peace over and over again not only as a young shepherd but also as a great warrior and king. He had received God's grace so many times, always undeserving of it, always grateful for it. Noah had found grace centuries earlier, as he trusted in God's ship design and plan of salvation. Isaiah

described Jesus as the Prince of Peace, which we sing about today. Paul described himself as the chief of sinners, yet he consistently shared his extreme gratitude for the free gift of grace which he delighted to share. In Jesus' own words as translated in John 16, He told us everything "so that we could have peace in Him."

We are all surrounded moment by moment by God's amazing grace. The very air we breathe is the right mixture of gases that our bodies need to sustain us. He created families and friends and gave us work to do as colaborers with Him. We are blessed with palm trees and roses and dolphins and soaring eagles in our corner of the world. But most precious of all is the grace He gave us by redeeming us with His own life and giving us all eternity to live with Him! My soul can be at peace because His grace does not depend on what I have done for Him, but rather what God has done for me!

And because our heavenly Father has gifted us with His amazing grace and peace, and because we have been designed in His image, isn't it only right to pass that gift of grace along to others? Have you been ignored? Insulted? Gossiped about? Perhaps you are dealing with someone's anger, or carelessness, or unloveliness? Follow the GRACE and PEACE plan. Recognize your own blessings, allow yourself to be filled with God's grace, then spill it over to that other person. You will have peace. He guarantees it!

A definition of synergy is "two or more things working together in order to create something that is bigger or greater than the sum of their individual efforts." That is the essence most dictionaries render. Wouldn't it be great if you looked up "synergy" in the dictionary and it said "church"? Isn't that what church is? It is two or more gathering and working together in order to create something bigger or greater than the sum of each

individual's effort. And when you add in the Holy Spirit, you are talking about infinite exponentials.

The Holy Spirit has already given each of us a head start, because He gives us His gifts, referred to as "spiritual gifts." If they go unused, His exponential blessings are hindered. When you are not using your spiritual gifts for God's work, you are bringing down the level of what the entire church will

accomplish. That's a heavy thought! **Your** participation is necessary to reach our optimum potential – an exponential potential.

When I was in high school, I played clarinet in the band. Clarinets either sound good or extremely bad. There isn't much in between. If you didn't tune your instrument correctly, you could be playing an entire concert either too sharp or too flat. And if your embouchure is slightly off you squeak. When that happens, you'd better hope that all the other instruments are playing very loudly, including the percussion. The more I practiced the less I squeaked, but one time plainly stood out. During one of our big concerts, I squeaked after the song had actually ended! Somehow, I squeaked -- loudly -- right on the downbeat of what would have been the next measure. My face turned the color of our band uniforms - a bright red.





Having been part of the band in high school, and in multiple singing groups throughout my life, it is easy for me to understand the nature of synergy, and the importance that every instrument or voice plays to create a result greater than the sum of its parts. The soprano, alto, tenor and bass... the trumpet, tympani, flute, violin, and tuba all have their individual sounds and important parts to play, which when done correctly yields powerful and moving results. It isn't 1 + 1 = 2. In music, as in life, 1 + 1 is greater than 2. A musical group exceeds the sum of its parts.

For those of you who are athletes and not musicians, you can attest to a similar exponential effect in team sports. Working together, as a team, someone's best performance inspires other players to rise to their best. Athletes are there for each other to make up for deficiencies when plays are missed. Each one has a different role to play, a different skill they excel at. Yet as a team they stand together and use every fiber of muscle, every



ounce of energy and endurance, to reach a goal that could not be reached individually.

You are on a team. You are part of a group. God calls it His church. We call it "The Port Charlotte Seventh-day Adventist Church." You have a role to play. You have gifts to employ.

For awhile now, a small group of church members has been carrying the load for the entire church. Not only does that lead to burn out, but we have missed out on seeing what our full potential could have been. The Lord's hopes for our church will not exceed the spiritual gifts He has granted it. But those gifts must be used.

We are delighted that Pastor Ben will be with us soon. But when he is here, his role as pastor and leader does not mean he should do all the visitation, or all the praying, or all the planning, etc. That was never God's plan. By sending Pastor Ben, God has granted us one more opportunity to become the church He's been waiting for us to become. Let's not waste it by hiding behind excuses.

It's time for all hands on deck. It's time for us to work together in harmony and in unity. It's time to fulfill God's mission for our church.


